PARISH PLAN UPDATE



The Parish Plan is going really well! A huge thank you to everyone who took the time to fill in the questionnaire. Of the 370 households in the parish we have received completed questionnaires from 225 which makes an impressive response rate of over 61%.

The purpose of this update is to reassure you that work is going on to make good use of the information that you have provided and to offer some feedback on the points that you have raised. The survey has given us some fascinating insights and many useful and imaginative comments and suggestions to add to the those that we reported back to you in the first update and which came mainly out of the parish plan launch event. On page 4 of this update, we have set out a brief survey of the data that the survey provided.



The survey responses demonstrate huge affection for the parish amongst residents and who can be surprised when it includes scenes like this?

What is happening next?

Over the rest of the summer work will go on to analyse the data and the comments that you have provided in order to identify the things that concern people the most. We will also begin to try to understand what opportunities might exist to meet those concerns and any restraints that may need to be overcome.

The next milestone will be an open meeting on the afternoon of **Saturday 30th September** in the Parish Hall, starting at 2pm, when members of the parish plan team will summarise the survey responses for each of the main topics (traffic, parking, built environment, amenities and community) and report on any relevant background issues. The next stage will consist of gatherings of all who are interested with the aim of exploring options and solutions. This will lead into working out how these ideas can be implemented.

All of this will inform the first draft of the plan which will be circulated for comment. We will then develop the draft to take account of feedback and responses and then recirculate drafts as often as it takes to get to a plan that fairly reflects both the majority and minority views across the Parish.

Will we get all this done by the end of the year? Only time will tell, but we'll do out best!

So it is good to be able to report that Hampshire County Council are drawing up plans to enhance the flood drainage capacity around the Pitt triangle area and will shortly remove the sandbag wall once they have the agreement of the local householders whose properties are most at risk of flooding.

Internet

We've done some homework and apparently Hursley Parish now has Superfast Internet Access - 41% of residents currently have access (but you have to upgrade), 7% will have access very soon but for 52%, it is further down the line. FROM THE SURVEY



Perhaps the most striking thing to emerge from the survey is that the parish of Hursley is far from being an homogenous entity. Instead it consists of a number of distinct settlements with different sets of allegiances. Of the 370 households in the Parish, 210 are located within Hursley village leaving 160 households scattered across the wider parish. So the village itself accounts for less than 60% of the parish. For many parts of the parish, the village and perhaps the notion of 'Hursley' offers very little. This thought finds support in the fact that twice as many households within the village responded to the questionnaire as did those elsewhere in the parish. All of this generates interesting challenges in coming up with a parish plan for all the parish!

So what picture of the parish does the survey paint? Firstly it is very settled, the average length of time that households have lived in the parish is just short of seventeen years. Those who own their own homes account for 70% while the remainder are tenants. We are probably a community with fewer than average single person households to judge from the fact that the households that returned surveys have an average of 2.8 residents per household compared to a national average of 2.3. If that average holds good for those households that didn't respond, it suggests that the population of the parish is

around 1,000 people. We also have significantly fewer 26-35 year-olds than the national average, a reflection perhaps on the lack of affordable housing.

Anyone who has stood on the platform at Winchester station in the rush hour might be forgiven for thinking that this part of the world is all London dormitory but that is far from the case in Hursley where only 20% of the population work outside Hampshire.

Something that comes out very strongly from the results is that people are very happy about living in Hursley and keen to do so for a long time. Around 60% came to live in Hursley because they specifically chose to live in a village or rural setting. We asked how long people would like to stay in the parish and the vast majority hoped to stay for a very long time. It follows that there is an underlying commitment to maintain the character of the parish.

The big issues continue to be traffic and, in the village, parking, but most respondents offered balanced and nuanced views about these issues - perhaps not surprisingly since the survey shows that over 90% use a car or van more than once a week.

So, an initial impression from having studied all the responses is that people love living here. There are many things that they treasure and a few irritants. Overall most people seem to want to keep things much as they are while encouraging some of the positive aspects of the 21st century such as broadband but pushing back the negatives - such as too many cars driving too fast and too many cars competing for too few parking spaces.
